Saving the City \$231,125.83

On May 11, 2010, we realized a net savings of \$231,125.83 by re-funding a series of General Obligation Bonds which are due to mature in 2020. This process was a first for our City. We were able to secure these savings by taking advantage of the lower interest rates currently being found in the Municipal Bond Market. General Obligation Bonds are usually used to finance major projects, are issued

for a specific purpose and many, like these, are voter approved. The interest rate a city receives is based on market conditions, the city's financial history and ability to pay. This is reflected in the City's Bond Rating which is of utmost importance in municipal financing and underwriting. Then there are exterior financial pressures. Like many other state and local governments, we are experiencing unprecedented stress on our budget. This is why it is imperative that we do all we can to manage our resources, our spending and our debt. In this case we 'managed' a significant savings. This was an interesting and exciting process to be a part of. At times it was intense as the sale was timed down to the minute and the market was in a constant state of flux. We had a great team assisting us. First Southwest served as our Financial Advisor and provided underwriting and timing advice. Sechrist-Duckers was invaluable as our Bond Counsel as they prepared the complex contracts and helped us avoid the numerous legal pitfalls. Wells Fargo Bank, whom we selected as our Underwriter, also played an important role after they agreed to enter into the Purchase Agreement. As exciting as this transaction was, please know that both Staff and Council are constantly searching for ways to conserve and manage our assets to best serve the City.

City Earns Higher Bond Rating

Prior to the aforementioned bond sale, the City had to go through an extensive financial review and interview process with Standard & Poor's. I was on the phone with the analysts for a little over thirty minutes and, though a little nervous, I thought we were prepared. Turns out we were. I am proud to report that as a result of our strong financial practices and policies, Meadows Place moved up from an A+ to a AA-. This is extremely exciting, especially in the current financial environment. This resulted in a better interest rate and additional savings when we refinanced our bonds. Our higher rating will also benefit us in future financial transactions. Elaine Herff, Melody Vaal and Rick Staigle all played a major role in helping Meadows Place improve it's financial status.

Did You Know?...

Did You Know... it's been a year since we had our first Town Meeting at Splash Night? Time flies doesn't it? At that meeting we unveiled our new overhead projector, the Community Center upgrades and showed a power point presentation about upcoming City projects. Covered were the plans for our Waste Water Treatment Plant and Reclaimed Water project, Phase IV of the Parks Improvement Program with an early view of the new Lake in the Park and then we showed a series of slides explaining the Meadows Place portion of the 2007 County Road Mobility Bond Project. It showed both the Airport and Kirkwood portions of the project. However, when it comes to dealing with TxDOT, multiple governmental agencies, engineering companies and contract approvals, time does NOT fly. It's been a year and we just accepted an engineering proposal for the Airport section of the project and are negotiating the contract. We hope to be in position to award the construction contract late this year or early 2011. West Airport is where all of our energies and attention have been focused and we will not be talking much about Kirkwood until we are closer to the Airport construction contract being let. This has not been the case for some who have a negative personal opinion of the Kirkwood proposal and they have been out sharing their opinions. Certainly everyone one has a right to their opinion and the right to talk to their neighbors but based on some of the things we've heard, I felt it best to address the issue of the Kirkwood Roundabouts much earlier than we normally would.


We are months away from doing anything concrete on the Roundabouts. At this point, what we have is a preliminary concept and not much else. We do have an independent agency (Texas Transportation Institute out of Texas A&M) performing a feasibility study and are waiting on these results to address the viability of this project. This study is being paid for by the Houston-Galveston Area Council, not the City of Meadows Place. I am no Roundabout engineer but after all the researching and study I have done, after driving multiple Roundabouts in Texas, California and Colorado, and after talking to Mayors and officials across the nation, I am more confident than ever that Roundabouts will be much, much better for Meadows Place than what we have now.

First of all, we won't be forcing cars to stop Forty-Eight thousand times a day! That is 12,000 cars a day X 4 stop signs = 48,000 times a day we are making cars stop, start, take up lane space on the roadway, use more fuel and pollute more. With our traffic count, the only reason you have to have four lanes is because you have to create 48,000 short term parking spaces a day that will be completely unnecessary if you allow the traffic to keep moving - as the Roundabouts will do.

We have also heard concerns that we are 'going to lose all that stop sign revenue'. After hearing that, I checked the stats for the first quarter of this year. For the quarter we have taken in \$2,942.00 in revenues from Kirkwood stop sign violations - and that's before the State takes its cut, which is about 50% depending on the plea. Not exactly the cash cow many believe them to be. I am more concerned with providing an esthetically pleasing system that will safely improve traffic flow like Roundabouts do than I am with potential income from making those cars stop 48,000 times a day. For many, the reduction in pollution alone is reason enough to convert to Roundabouts. The police department will remain as active as they need to be to make sure this area, and the rest of the City, remain safe.

For some reason, there were even 'rumors' that we would lose our School Crossing Guard if we had Roundabouts. Nothing could be further from the truth, BUT, just to make sure, I asked Superintendent Dr. Tim Jenney about it. He confirmed that they were NOT planning on removing our crossing guard. We both agree that our children's safety is paramount and statistics prove again and again that a two lane roundabout is far safer for pedestrians than what we have now. Plus, we don't stop traffic 48,000 times a day.


Mosquitoes

Summer is here, and it's that time of year where we all need to try our best to

in Meadows Place. The best way to control mosquito growth is to keep our properties free of ponding water, keep bushes trimmed to allow airflow and general lawn maintenance.



Public Works will complete the storm drain treatments by the end on May. This treatment is good for up to 6 months. Fort Bend County samples and monitors the

mosquito growth in our city twice a week during the mosquito season and updates Public Works on species type, total counts, disease, etc, on a weekly basis or more if needed.



Water Main Breaks

Meadows Place experiences thirty to sixty water main breaks per year. Most occur from June through October. Once the leak is reported an operator and digging crew will be dispatched to investigate the leak and dig it up to make the repair.

You may experience a water outage due to a repair on a main line break. The water pressure is normally restored in a short period of time. If you see a main break please report it to Southwest Water at 713-405-1750 or Public Works at 281-983-2950.

The Bill Blackwood Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas (LEMIT) was established by the State Legislature in 1987. LEMIT is responsible for developing

the analytical, administrative, and executive skills of current and future law enforcement administrators and executives in Texas. LEMIT administers a variety of programs to accomplish this mandate – one of which is the Leadership Command College (LCC). The LCC is one of the nation's premiere law enforcement management programs, with a curriculum covering all aspects of modern police management.

Applicant eligibility requirements include: must be currently employed as a Texas peace officer, have a minimum of five years of law enforcement experience, and be assigned to a mid-level or administrative position for at least two years. They also must sign a statement pledging their commitment to the program – part of which includes remaining in the law enforcement profession for at least three years after graduation. The highly competitive application process culminates with attendance in a sixteen hour overview course. Applicants are tested at the end of the course and ranked for admission into the LCC.

We are proud to announce that Captains Jack Ashton and Gary Stewart have been accepted into the program. The LCC is produced through a consortium of three state universities, each hosting a fifteen day module. In addition to the three classroom modules (totaling nine weeks), an administrative research paper is required. Captain Ashton is scheduled to attend Module I in April 2011, and Captain Stewart will begin in June 2011. Each will be assigned a date for Module II upon completion of the first module. LEMIT encourages participants to complete the LCC within two years. The entire cost for each participant is underwritten by the Texas Legislature. Graduates of the LCC may apply for and receive either nine hours of undergraduate college credit or six hours of graduate credit through Sam Houston State University.



These are typical concerns as more and more cities install modern roundabouts. A report at the 2008 National Roundabout Conference by DLZ Engineers, an award winning firm with offices throughout Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Kentucky, came to this conclusion regarding roundabouts and the public: "Most issues/ concerns are due to a lack of understanding."

This seems to prove the results from this comparative study by the Institute for Highway Safety Public Acceptance Study which states:

The IIHS conducted a study in communities where a modern roundabout has been installed, to compare before and after public opinion. The preliminary results of the IIHS study show that once citizens experience a modern roundabout, their attitudes change toward acceptance. The "strongly favor" category doubled from 16% to 32% and the "somewhat favor" category doubled from 15% to 31% while the "strongly oppose" category went from 41% to 15%. These are encouraging trends.

They are encouraging because the use of Roundabouts is growing exponentially throughout the United States. Statements like "No one else has them" simply are not true. For instance, Carmel, Indiana has over 50 now and will have 66 by the end of summer. Check their website for additional information on roundabouts including a brochure that they made available online.

So, if you are hearing statements like "If you do build a roundabout, it will be the 'Mother of all Bad Intersections'. We could sell tickets to see it" or "They will be easy to find; just look for a traffic jam and the ground piled up with broken glass and car parts" please understand that many others have heard or said the same thing. Please give us a little more time to complete our studies and consider this, "Warren Miller, Vail's sternest critic of the roundabouts, in preconstruction days, has begun to pluck raven feathers. In an interview last week, he conceded he was wrong about the roundabouts."

Check our website, as we have put some additional links for you, come by City Hall for a brochure or contact the Mayor or Councilman Staigle. Either will be more than happy to sit down with you one on one to address any questions or concerns.

Now, back to what I started with, ... it's been a year since we had our first Town Meeting at Splash Night but we will be having another one this Splash Night, Friday, June 11. Mayor and Council will be there from 7:30 to 8:30 with each Council member giving a brief comment on something near and dear to them. This should allow enough time for a Q&A after. Hope to see you there.

City Ordinances / Code Enforcement



We all want to show pride in our community, and by displaying that pride we can also all be building the values of our homes. I believe that we would all like to be considered "good" neighbors, and also have the same expectations of the family living next door. It's difficult to know what expectations your neighbors have of you, and you also may not know what

expectations the city also has, so I've put together a list of 10 common issues that some of you may not be familiar with.

Solid Waste & Recycling: Please be sure that you are not placing items curbside for collection any sooner than the evening (after 5 pm) prior to pick-up. Trash days are Tuesdays & Fridays. Friday is heavy trash day & Recycling. Empty trash cans & recycle bins need to be removed from the curbside promptly the day that they are collected. Please do not store your cans & bins in public view during non-collection days.

Trailers, Boats & RV's: Trailers, Boats & RV's cannot be stored in public view. This includes BBQ's on trailers.

Grass & Weeds: Grass & weeds cannot exceed 9 inches in height. Each resident also needs to keep the cracks of concrete clear from grass / weeds AND edging must be done along all edges of grass and concrete.

Inoperable Vehicles: Vehicles must be kept in good working condition, and must be legally registered and displaying a current registration and inspection sticker as required by law.

Fences: Fences must be maintained in good condition. If your fence is not structurally sound or has missing pickets then it needs to have maintenance performed.

Animal Control Violations: No dog may Run at Large within the city. Animals that are outside of their normal enclosure must be restrained by a leash and under the control of a capable owner or keeper. The city also annually registers all animals over the age of 6 months. Animal owners are required to provide proof of current rabies vaccination status and will be issued a city tag at the cost of \$1.

Stumps: Tree stumps need to be cut flush with the natural grade or be removed.

Inoperable Gas Light Posts: Non-functioning gas lamps can pose a potential risk, and need to have the gas line capped by a licensed plumber prior to the removal of the lamp post.

Signs: Contractor signs cannot be displayed in yards.

Junk, Trash & Debris: Yards need to be kept clear of any accumulation of debris, which includes old newspapers or circulars. All yards (front & rear) are required to be kept in a sanitary manner.

It is very easy to be taken over by the speed in which your life is moving by, and by focusing yourself on completing your laundry list of tasks you may not notice someone who is in need. Please remember that we are a COMMUNITY. We have residents of every age and walk of life. A simple task of trimming back a tree branch 10 feet above the sidewalk may not be a problem for most people, but it is a huge obstacle for others. Please be mindful of your neighbor's needs and offer assistance if you are able. You can also contact my office if you are not able to assist them and I will try to find them assistance when possible.




