Policy making is often undervalued and misunderstood yet it is the central role of our City Council. These policies effect each and every one of us and will have a lasting effect on

our city for years to come. These policies are the result of a process that is always in motion, incremental in its operation and sometimes seems incoherent and confused. Yet, the future of a community, the culmination of its collective dreams and aspirations are a result of this very demanding policy-making process.

With all we have going on lately, it is this very process that I have had the most questions about. People have come to City Council meetings expecting a discussion on a project not quite understanding that the main business of our city council meeting is to take care of city business. Yes, unlike many other cities, we do have a section for community comments, but by the time a new policy or project makes the agenda, it is for a yes or no vote by council and is not there for public input. The time for that has long since passed as Council is now ready to make a decision based on things like benefits to the community, maintainability, funding and budget impact. The policy or project on the agenda had already been discussed, dissected, studied, and reviewed by committees and/or council or both well before it ever became an agenda item.

"When did that happen", is often followed by a frustrated "Why didn't I know about it". I assure you, your Mayor and Council share your frustration regarding communication. The City meets all legal obligations regarding citizen notification and goes above and beyond what is required to get the word out about what is going on. We are always looking for the best way to communicate and are currently looking at new ways to "get the word out" including the possibility of initiating a "Twitter" account. Currently we use the Newsletter, newspapers, the bulletin board at City Hall, the marquee by the pool, the calendar on the website and signs around the city.

Now, if you want to see your Council in action, if you want to see how the decisions are made, see what gets tabled and what gets put into committee, you need to check for announcements on Council Workshops and Public Hearings – and then attend. This is where the grunt work is done. This is where public input takes place. This is where the tough decisions are made. This is where you can see why it often takes months, or even years, for something to finally get on the agenda at a Council Meeting. Attending these meetings will answer all those questions and let your voice be heard. I hope you do.

Public Meeting Notice

There will be a Public Meeting on Thursday, January 14th, 2010 at 7:00pm at the Community Center for all persons interested in serving on Meadows Place MCIA Board of Directors.

Council plans to reestablish the MCIA in the first quarter of 2010. Though most of the burden of protecting property values now lies with Code Enforcement, the enforcement and selection of choice of paint color and roofing can be strengthened through the reestablishment of the MCIA Board of Directors.

A maximum of Five (5) Board Members will be chosen by Council. The board President, who will serve as the sole liaison with the City, will be chosen by the board. The primary responsibility of the MCIA Board of Directors will be updating and maintaining a 'Book of Colors' at City Hall for citizens to use for paint selection. Among other things, they will meet on a regular basis and be available to any citizen that wishes to request a variance on paint color. MCIA Board members are also expected to cooperate with our Code Enforcement Officer and be additional "eyes and ears" for the City. The Mayor, the City Attorney, and Code Enforcement Officer will be at the meeting to explain what we need the MCIA Board to do, what we hope to accomplish and to answer any questions.

How do I get on the Board?

1. Prior to the Meeting you will need to leave your 'resume' at City Hall in an envelope marked MCIA. This 'resume' needs to contain your Name, Address, Contact information, and the reason why you wish to serve on this board - along with any background or experience that you have that you feel would make you stand out to Council. Feel free to include references, etc.

2. Attend the Meeting. - This is to ensure you understand the new role of the MCIA Board of Directors, the legal ramifications and limitations, what you can and cannot do, etc. It will also be a time for you to ask questions and give input.

3. Can I attend if I am not sure? - Yes, but if you think you might want to be on the MCIA Board, be sure to hand in a 'resume' prior to the meeting. Then, if you change your mind, just let City Hall know.

Your Meadows Place Police Department periodically receives complaints from residents regarding parking issues. Our streets can become congested when people choose to park on the street, and some of you might believe it should not be allowed at all. However, state law does not prohibit it. Sometimes we create parking problems without meaning to, and often times simply thinking before we act prevents us from parking illegally. Basic

courtesy and respect for others who live in our community and use our streets goes a long way. This month I would like to emphasize a few laws from the Texas Transportation Code that govern parking on our streets:

- 1. No parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant
- 2. No parking within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection
- 3. No parking within 30 feet on the approach to a STOP sign
- 4. Park with your right-hand wheels parallel to and within 18 inches of the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway

The first one is easy to understand – nobody wants to be the person blocking a fire truck from accessing a fire hydrant. The next two deal with safety and with limiting visibility at intersections. The fourth law is also for our safety. It is designed to prevent drivers from crossing oncoming traffic both when they park and when they pull away.

We hope you have taken the time to read this, and you

will remember that safety is everyone's responsibility. Let's work together to keep our streets as safe as possible

Dulles High School Day

The City of Meadows Place recognizes Dulles High School as one of the top high schools in the Nation, proclaims Friday, September 25, as Dulles High School Day

FORT BEND ISD - At its September 22 City Council Meeting, Meadows Place City Council voted unanimously to approve a proclamation to recognize Dulles High School as one of the top high schools in the Nation. The Meadows Place City Council also proclaimed Friday, September 25, as Dulles High School Day in the City of Meadows Place. Meadows Place Mayor Charles Jessup said, "Dulles High School has been doing an exceptional service for the community for close to 50 years and is one of the best high schools in the nation."

The proclamation cited that Dulles High School was ranked in the top six percent of high schools in the Nation by Newsweek Magazine and included in the magazine's complete list of the 1,500 top 2009 United States high schools, according to a ratio of the number of Advanced Placement tests taken by all students. Dulles was also recently named one of the top high schools in the Houston area (#17) by a Houston Chronicle report based on a Children at Risk Study to see who is doing the best at educating students and preparing them for post-secondary education.

The City of Meadows Place also recognized that Dulles High School has 12 National Merit Semifinalists named for 2010, which are part of a nationwide pool of semifinalists, which represents less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors and includes the highest scoring entrants in each state.

Mayor Jessup and City Council Members said in the proclamation, "The City of Meadows Place recognizes the benefits for its residents to live in a community with the exceptional Dulles High School and extends its full support for the Dulles Football Team on Saturday night, IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Meadows authorizes September 25, 2009, as Dulles High School Day in the City of Meadows Place." The mayor read the proclamation to Dulles students at a pep rally at the school on Friday, Sept. 25.

City Ordinances / Code Enforcement



Y and care is a critical part of exterior maintenance for your home, and in Texas it is a year round necessity. Grass and weeds cannot grow longer than 9 inches in length without becoming a violation of City Ordinance. Grass & weeds are also not permitted to grow over concrete surfaces, such as; curbs and sidewalks in excess of 9 inches.

Proper care of your lawn is considered a health and safety issue, as the environment is impacted by improper care. Remembering to keep yard debris out of storm drains is critical to the proper function of our drainage system. Storm drains are designed to carry rain water away from our streets, and into our local bayous. Yard waste can impede the flow of run off water, and can contaminate it as well.

Here are some tips for you to help keep our storm drains clean and clear:

• Don't over-water your lawn. Much of the water applied to lawns and gardens is never absorbed by the plants. Water applied too rapidly is lost as runoff, which may carry polluting fertilizers and pesticides to our bayous and lakes.

• Use the correct amount of fertilizer and pesticides. Fertilizers and pesticides are used to compensate for the loss of nutrients and protection once provided by organic debris and rich soil. As your soil loses its organic matter; it allows more of these chemicals to run off and wash through it – contributing to the pollution of lakes, streams and underground water supplies.

• Keep your yard mowed frequently for a natural fertilizer. By leaving a small amount of grass clippings on the lawn to decompose, it provides about 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 sq ft of lawn per year, along with the perfect balance of essential nutrients that aren't included in most chemical fertilizers.

• Bag your lawn waste in paper lawn bags for curbside collection. If you chose to not compost your yard waste, be sure to bag all yard clippings each time you mow. Check the storm drains located near your property and clear away any debris that may have collected with a rake or shovel. Most home improvement stores sell large yard waste paper bags to allow you to use a "green" approach to remove excess clippings.

Yard waste can be placed curbside for collection on your regular trash days, Tuesday & Friday. If you use a lawn service, please ensure that they are not setting out your clippings curbside on a day other than the collection day. Probable Garage Sale Discussion Options


As part of the Public Meeting, a poll will be taken on the following options as a guide for Council.

1. No Change in existing ordinance. This leaves us with a total of six Garage Sales a year allowing an individual to only have two (2) per year. Permit required.

2. Amend Ordinance - to allow a total of Four (4) Garage Sales per year but allowing an individual to participate in all four (4) if they so choose. Permit required.

3. Amend Ordinance - to allow Zero (0) garage sales per year.

Non **Build A Disaster Plan Kit**



ere is our last Hurricane Preparedness article for H this year, as November marks the end of another

Hurricane season. Here are suggestions for building a Disaster Kit followed by tips on how to care for your beloved pets during a time of crisis. Whether it's a

large-scale natural catastrophe or an unforeseen emergency that causes you to leave your home temporarily, everyone's family can benefit from having a household evacuation plan

in place before disaster strikes. Every disaster plan must include your pets!

What you have on hand when a disaster happens can make a big difference. Plan to store enough supplies for everyone in your household for at least three days. Store your supplies in a sturdy but easy to carry container. A large covered



trash container, overnight backpack or duffel bag will work. This kit should contain the following items and include any additional items appropriate to the needs of your family.

MOST IMPORTANTLY

Practice your disaster plans, practice your evacuation routes, and remind household members what needs to be done in the event of an emergency or disaster. What you have on hand when a disaster happens can make a big difference. Plan to store enough supplies for everyone in your household for at least three days. Store your supplies in a sturdy but easy to-carry container. A large covered trash container, overnight backpack or duffel bag will work. This kit should contain the following items and include any additional items appropriate to the needs of your family.

PREPAREDNESS

WATER

Have at least one gallon per person per day on hand.

FOOD

Non-perishable, high protein items such as energy bars, ready-to -eat soup and peanut butter will work. Make sure to select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation, cooking and little or no water.

FLASHLIGHT

Make sure extra batteries are included.

FIRST AID KIT

Include a reference guide if possible.

BATTERY-OPERATED RADIO

Make sure extra batteries are included.

MEDICATIONS

Don't forget prescription and non-prescription items.

CLOTHING

Provide a change of clothes for everyone including sturdy shoes, gloves, small pillow and blanket.

Have cash. ATMs and credit cards won't work if power is out of service or overloaded.

TOOLS

Items should include a wrench to turn off gas if necessary, a manual can opener, a screwdriver, duct tape, hammer, pliers, knife, plastic sheeting, garbage bags, and zip ties.

PERSONAL ITEMS

Examples include; eyeglasses, contact lenses, and solution; copies of important papers, including ID cards, insurance policies, birth certificates, passports, etc. and comfort items such as toys and books.

PET SUPPLIES

Pets need to be included too. Make sure you have adequate supplies including food, water, litter box or plastic bags, medication and vaccination information.

CONTACT INFORMATION

Carry a current list of family phone numbers and e-mail addresses, including someone out of the area who may be easier to reach if local phone lines are out of service or overloaded.

MAP

Consider making an evacuation route on it from your local area.

OTHER

Include any necessary items for infants, seniors and people with disabilities in your kit. Check your supplies and replace the food and water every six months.

Caring for your pets

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) offers the following tips to pet owners designing an emergency safety plan:

- If you evacuate your home, DO NOT LEAVE YOUR PETS BEHIND! Pets most likely cannot survive on their own; and if by some remote chance they do, you may not be able to find them when you return.
- For public health reasons, many emergency shelters cannot accept pets. Find out which motels and hotels in your area allow pets -- well in advance of needing them. Include your local animal shelter's number in your list of emergency numbers - they might be able to provide information concerning pets during a disaster.
- Make sure identification tags are up to date and securely fastened to your pet's collar. If possible, attach the address and/or phone number of your evacuation site. If your pet gets lost, his tag is his ticket home. It is important to have a current photo of your pet for identification purposes.
- It is a good idea to have a secure pet carrier, leash or harness for your pet so that if he panics, he can't escape.
- Take pet food, bottled water, medications, veterinary records, cat litter/pan, can opener, food dishes, first aid kit and other supplies with you in case they're not available later. While the sun is still shining, consider packing a "pet survival" kit which could be easily deployed if disaster hits






