Meadows Place Hosts Visitors

Later this month, Public Works Director, Erik Tscahnz and I will be hosting several Fort Bend cities as they come to inspect our reclaimed water system. As the cost of water goes up and the population grows, everyone is looking for alternative water sources. They were told to come look at our system to see how cost efficient a reclaimed system can be.

Using reclaimed water for much of our irrigation, Meadows Place saves money that we would otherwise have to pay to the Fort Bend Subsidence District, just like you do. Visits like this are not uncommon. Last month folks from Missouri City came over to inspect our lake. One Councilperson, who had been a super sceptic, did a complete 180 after visiting our park and walking out to the lake. The ducks, egrets, clear water and beautiful birds were proof that reclaimed water usage can enhance an area and become a great spot for families to fish, picnic and just hang out. We should all be proud of our lake and use of reclaimed water that benefits so many people – financial and otherwise.

Construction Comments

As we said, Road Construction projects are a mess and the Kirkwood project is no exception. Rain and utility challenges have caused problems but it is actually moving forward at a decent pace. I am happy about that, but am even more pleased with the attitude of the contractor. They are doing good work and have done a good job looking after our residents – like tagging each house that was going to have their water shut off. Did You Know... Road Use Fee Increase

City Council had a very energetic meeting to look into the best options for the city when current bonds become eligible to be paid off. Roads and Infrastructure were the most difficult issues to find a solution for but also the one we most need to look at. It was a very intense meeting that led us to asking or estimates so we can make more educated evaluations at our next meeting.

Note: Council voted to raise the Road Use Fee from \$5.00 to \$10.00 a month. This is a dedicated fee with proceeds being used exclusively on internal street repairs.

In a unanimous vote, City Council confirmed her to a term which expires at the end of December 2020. City Election

There will be a City of Meadow Place General Election on May 4, 2019. Two Council positions are up - Alderman 4 and Alderman 5. The Alderman 5 position, filled by Kelle Mills, is uncontested so she will return. However two candidates have filed to run for position 4, the position being vacated by Terry Henley. Council approved an agreement with the County to conduct the election. It will cost the City of Meadows approximately \$5,400 so please vote in the Meadow Place General Election – May 4, 2019.


Winter Vegetables

Human Trafficking is Modern Day Slavery

Human trafficking is modern day slavery. Victims of human trafficking are subjected to force, fraud, or coercion, for the purpose of sexual

exploitation and/or forced labor.

What is Human Trafficking: Human trafficking is a form of slavery that has been going on for many centuries and is still alive and well and spreading throughout the United States and the world. According to Polaris, "human traffickers use violence, threats, lies, debt bondage, and other forms of coercion to compel adults and children to engage in commercial sex acts against their will.

"Under U.S. federal law, any minor under the age of 18 years induced into commercial sex is a victim of human trafficking—regardless of whether or not the trafficker used force, fraud, or coercion."

Where is Human Trafficking happening: Human trafficking is occurring in a range of venues including online ads or escort services, fake massage parlors, residential brothels, cantinas, on the street or at truck stops, or at hotels and motels (Polaris). It is important to note that the internet has become a hotbed for traffickers and buyers, making it easier for them to generate business and spread out.

Is Human Trafficking Happening Here: While we may imagine this nefarious business happening in other corners of the world, the truth is that it is happening in our own city, in our own backyard. The U.S. Department of Justice identified the I-10 corridor as the #1 human trafficking route in the U.S. with as many as 1 in 4 victims passing through the Houston Metro-Plex." "There have been 957 suspected victims and 1,057 suspected human trafficking incidents reported by Texas-based reporting agencies to federal databases since 2007."

How to get involved: One suggestion from Meadows Place Resident Jimmy Fenwick is working with the Freedom Church Alliance's "GoBox" Program (https://www. freedomchurchalliance.org/gobox/). The GoBox is a selfcontained toolkit that provides helpful resources and specific guidance to empower you and your churches to become a vital part of fighting human trafficking in Houston.

Please Join the Meadows Place Police Department and the City of Meadows place in fighting Human Trafficking.



Don't be a Victim - Do your homework

How often do you hear of someone being taken advantage of by a contractor? Unfortunately, it happens all too often, thus giving reputable and legitimate contractors a bad name. While the majority of contractors may be trustworthy, there are others who are unscrupulous and unreliable. Some will fix items that don't need fixing, or grossly overcharge you for services or parts. Worse, there are plenty of con artists posing as tradesmen who will simply take your money and run.

Take time to do your homework and select a trustworthy contractor to do the job. As the spring home improvement season approaches, look out for these "red flags" which can indicate a contractor may be unscrupulous. Beware if the contractor:

• Drives an unmarked van with out-of-state license plates - Be suspicious of anyone who simply shows up and operates in nondescript vehicles with no business markings.

• Offers a special price if you sign today, or wants the money upfront or only in cash - A good contractor will never want CASH or the entire payment up front. There is usually a reasonable down payment and payments are in progression based on the construction schedule. It's practice for a contractor to ask for 1/3 of the total cost up front to cover purchasing material.

• Has no references - Get at least 3 references from other customers. Ask to talk to the contractor's last three customers, not his favorites. This ensures that the contractor is consistent in quality. If he refuses to get you past customer references, that

should be a sign that there will be a problem.

• Does not provide written estimates or contracts - Never trust a contractor who doesn't require a written contract. Never sign a blank contract or one with holes in it. If something goes wrong, you have no legal recourse because nothing was in writing. Get a contract that spells out cost of materials, labor, an outline of the project, and other important work details. If there are changes along the way add detailed "change orders" signed by all parties.

• Is not licensed – Always ask a contractor to see their licensing credentials, then verify this information with the local building inspector's office. Look up the contractor's Better Business Bureau rating. Even if your state doesn't require licenses for certain projects, your contractor should still be insured. Call their insurance carrier and make sure their policy is current and can cover your project.

• Does not look professional and does not have business cards or letterhead on invoices - Get a business card. Call the number on the card and make sure he picks up. (Some numbers are voicemail services that can't be traced.) Call the Better Business Bureau, go on Yelp and see if there are any complaints about him.

If you hire a contractor, you're trusting this person to come into your home and change the most expensive thing you own. So take the necessary precautions to avoid becoming a victim.





Code Enforcement - February 2019

March is MAILBOX MONTH here in the City of Meadows Place! Mailbox Month is the time we take a look at the first impression of your home & see what needs to be repaired or replaced and will result in a \$10 discount on your water bill!


Mailboxes are typically constructed to last about 10 years, depending on the materials used, and the USPS states that it is the homeowner's responsibility to maintain and replace worn or damaged mailboxes. If it has been quite a while since you have replaced yours, take an objective look at it.

HOW TO PARTICIPATE: Through the month of March; mail, place in the Utilities Billing Box or e-mail (utilities@cityofmeadowsplace.org) a "before" and "after" photo of your newly rejuvenated or replaced mailbox to City Hall. **Each participating residence will receive a \$10 discount off of their water utility bill!**

Some mailboxes only need fresh paint or minor maintenance like painting, rust removal, up-righting the post, etc., while other may need to be replaced altogether. Hardware stores like Lowes, Home Depot, and Court's Hardware sell reasonably priced replacements, and with a modest amount of effort you will have a fresh new look!

CURBSIDE MAILBOX STANDARDS:

- The bottom of the mailbox should be located between 41 45 inches in height from the surface of the curb.
- The name and address on your mailbox should be at least 1 inch letters/numbers.
- The front of your mailbox door should be located 6 8 inches from the front face of the curb.



Please contact our local post office if you are considering moving the location of your mailbox.






